From the Vicar's Desk

St Botolph's; a church with a vision



Who are we? Where have we been? And where are we going? The PCC spent a day with the Bishop of Colchester discussing these questions so that we can have a better understanding of how to lead St Botolph's church through the next season of our ministry.

At the heart of our vision is the desire to base all that we do on our belief that 'Jesus welcomes everyone'.

Jesus said, "If anyone is thirsty, let them come to me and drink" John 7:37

The outworkings of this vision include improving our signage and advertising, connecting with our local primary school and engaging with both church planners and our City council to discuss how we can play a part in making the St Botolph's area an attractive part of our City. We will share more details as we move forward, but for right now, I'd like to share two parts of the day.

First, Bishop Roger presented us with the 'Everybody Welcome' course. This material was developed with expert advice from John Lewis to help churches look afresh at how they welcome newcomers and see visitors become regular members of the congregation. This is just what we want to see at St Botolph's, so the PCC has committed to running and attending the sessions, and we want to extend this invitation beyond the PCC to the whole congregation.

The other gift Bishop Roger gave us was a conversation about our relationship with God. He explained that the Church of England has done a great job of helping churchgoers grasp God's awesomeness — which is good. But, he questioned whether this has been at the cost of our understanding of God's intimacy with us. Just as God's awesomeness is significant to helping us grow in faith, so is the recognition of God's close, personal love for us.

To help us understand our relationship with God, the Bishop asked us to divide a piece of paper into four sections. We then drew a picture in each of these sections showing how we pictured God – when we were a child, in times of difficulty, when God is close and right now. This exercise was really enlightening, so I encourage you to give it a go and if you would like to share what you have drawn, I would love to spend time talking it through with you.

So, be encouraged. God is working amongst us to draw us close to Him and to draw others to Him through us.

NOTES from St Botolph's PCC

There have been three PCC meetings since the last magazine

After a positive and interesting Away Day in February at Wivenhoe House, led by Bishop Roger, the PCC have spent time at the following PCC Meetings discussing a *Vision for St Botolph's in 2024*. It has been agreed to hold a series of *Everybody Welcome* meetings, for the PCC members and members of the congregation, to discuss a Vision for 2024.

At the following three meetings the PCC have also received various reports on other matters for PCC consideration.. The most important points are as below.

PCC 20th March

- Revd. Emma had already begun a Junior Church once a month and an approach to St. John's Green School was planned
- **Fabric**: The gutters had been cleared of debris and slates that had slipped ha been secured. The lights in the hallway and vicar's vestry had been replaced with LED lights.
- **Bookings**: March had been a busy month. The Booking Secretary said that at the moment we only had two stewards and we needed more help or bookings would have to be cancelled. April was going to be another busy month but we did have a baptism and wedding to look forward to later in the year.
- . The Bishop would be preaching at the Civic Service on 21st April.

PCC 17th April

- Revd Emma has visited St Johns School
- Safeguarding: Sarah Butcher, the Parish Safeguarding Officer attended the meeting and gave a talk on what safeguarding entailed and what we should look out for. Her full report is available.
- To help with the collection of parish funding, the Diocese is giving parishes bank card machines free for a period of twelve months, after which they could be kept, providing that they were being used advantageously. It was proposed that we accepted this offer and it was unanimously agreed.

- The church website has been updated by the Parish Administrator.
- APCM: The reports on the agenda at the APCM would be available to the electoral roll members two weeks before the meeting to give people time to read.
- **Fabric**: A plumber had been to look at the toilet at the back of the church and had estimated that to refurbish it would cost £4,572. Further estimates would be sought. Our first Aid Box in the church contained out of date contents and needed replacing.
- Finance: End of March Accounts were received and accepted
- **Bookings**: April is a busy month with 9 outside bookings: 4 concerts, 1 recording session, 1 school visit, 2 play reader group, 1 young archeologists.

PCC 8th May

- A Pastoral team had met and had a discussion on future needs.
- The Electoral Roll has to be renewed this year.
- Heritage Open days will be from 6th 16th September and stewards would be required on those days 10 am to 3 pm. It was suggested a Memory Board be provided for visitors to record their connections and memories with St Botolph's.
- It was learned that the church needed to be re-registered as a place of worship to be able to continue as a Fairtrade Church. It was proposed and agreed that this should be done.
- Colchester Episcopal Area is to hold the Ordination of Deacons at St Botolph's in September.
- **Fabric**: The south porch has been tidied and it was proposed and agreed to purchase two cupboards to go under the staircase, for a cost in the region of £400.
- **NET**: Extra equipment was required by NET to upgrade their present equipment in the tower. A PCC resolution was required and it was therefore proposed and agreed that *The PCC agreed that NET could apply for a faculty to install equipment deemed necessary in the power for upgrading.*
- Finance: The accounts had been circulated and were healthy.
- Worship: Leaders of Services are now introducing themselves, as requested.

• **Bookings:** Bookings were being handed over to Emily, PA at Christ Church. It was suggested that there should be an addition to the booking form that staging used should be assembled by the booked organisation and overseen by a church member.

Electoral Roll Officer's Report There are 43 names on the Electoral Roll having the last year lost six members but had gained three. After this meeting the Electoral Roll would be wiped clean and every person would have to re-apply before next year's meeting.

Church Warden's Report The report had been circulated previously but, since the year end, the church architect had carried out the Quinquennial inspection, and although the full report had not yet been received there were several important but minor things to be done on the outside of the building but there was nothing major needed.

Invite to Everybody Welcome This is a five week course that the PCC has committed to do plus any member of the congregation who would like to join them. The first four would be held monthly, on a Tuesday morning and the fifth during a Sunday service.

- Pray for God's wisdom and guidance.


PRIORITISING children, young people and families in our churches is fundamental. In most cases one of the key drivers has been committed leadership that sets the culture and sees youth and children's ministry as an essential priority.

We can **RESOURCE** growth through a range of activities such as toddler groups, craft activities, Messy Church, parent groups and youth groups. Volunteers are your best resource and if you have the option of employing a Youth and Children's Worker this can accelerate growth.

ADAPTING is crucial. The church must be prepared to change to ensure that it's a welcoming place for all ages. This might impact services and activities.

Churches that are growing acknowledge the whole family in their services, not just in their family activities.

This isn't just about leadership, this is about **YOU**. It's about everybody in the church. Whether you are 95 and can offer to pray for younger people or only five and can invite a friend along, we all have a part to play.



A Summer Wedding

In 2014, while in the county of Maramures in northern Romania, I visited Breb, a village "miles from anywhere" - about which I had read in William Blacker's book, Along the Enchanted Way.



A country bus dropped me at the top of a hill, down which I walked to Breb. To my amazement, immediately I met an ENGLISHMAN, who told me proudly that he was formerly a photographer for The Sun. He tried to rent me one of his wooden cabins, for an exorbitant price. I declined politely, and found accommodation in a wooden cottage (all to myself), on a farm for next-to-nothing; the farmer's mother brought over my breakfasts and my evening meals, from the farmhouse, also for next-to-nothing.

On the day I arrived there was a wedding at the local church.

The party that followed took place right next to my farm, and I "gawped" unashamedly at the wedding guests. The girls and young women wore headscarves, white blouses and flared skirts; the young men wore white shirts under embroidered waistcoats and tall, straw, Maramures summer hats.





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After the partying, they all gathered together and, with pipers piping, drummers drumming and fiddlers fiddling, they set off along a grassy track through the village. It is one of my best memories of Romania: I felt as if I was back in the 19th century, perhaps in a novel by Thomas Hardy.

On my last evening in Breb, the grandmother led me to a walled courtyard and into a wooden hut, where the farmer and others were busy distilling a plum brandy called horinca, and I was given a tot. It all seemed very secretive. Legal or illegal, I didn't know!

As often happened when I was in Romania, I was asked if I had met Prince Charles (as he was then). When I said No, they were surprised. They had met him (as have many people in Romania), and he owns a house in Breb. I wonder if he has tried the horinca!

In May there appeared a strange request for ladies to look in their sewing baskets for any spare thimbles they may have and give them to John Witard or David Poppleton. David has no idea why! Have you?

In the July/August edition Henry Spyvee, the secretary of the Colchester Churches wrote about two things they were working on.

"High Woods Project. This development between Turner Road and Ipswich Road will have a population of 11,000. What churches will it have? The Cecil's Executives have proved a useful meeting point for church leaders to discuss this. Anglicans, Baptists, Methodises and the United Reformed Church want to share a united witness from one building. As well as a church this building could be Community Centre and linked to a shared church school.

The Drug Problem. We are looking into what the Church ought to be doing. Are there people in your church who could help in this? Or people who could work with addicts? The right people exist in our churches — they will not be found solely among the young."







Thoughts from William's Garden
